#### CO-OPS AT THE CAPITAL: A LEGISLATIVE RECAP

The 2025 Minnesota legislative session concluded on June 9 after a special session to finalize the state budget. Throughout the session, the Minnesota Rural Electric Association (MREA) worked on be-

half of Minnesota's electric cooperatives advocating for policies that support reliable, affordable, and sustainable energy for member-owners statewide.

Shortly after legislators returned home, Speaker Emerita Melissa Hortman and her husband, Mark, along with their rescue dog Gilbert, were tragically killed. Senator John Hoffman and his wife, Yvette, were also injured at their home on the morning of June 14. Speaker Emerita Hortman was a longtime leader at the Capitol who had collaborated with MREA over the years on major legislation. Senator Hoffman is a bipartisan leader and an ally of Minnesota's electric cooperatives. We express our condolences to Speaker Hortman's family, wish Senator Hoffman a speedy recovery, and extend sympathies to all affected individuals.

As the state continues to process this tragedy, it's also important to reflect on the work that was accomplished during the 2025 legislative session — including key issues affecting Kandiyohi Power Cooperative.

# Ongoing Support for Reliable and Affordable Energy

While some prominent political debates gained attention this year, MREA focused on protecting the interests of co-op member-owners at the Capitol by advocating for fair and sensible energy policy and working against costly new mandates.

One major priority was reforming Minnesota's net metering law, which currently requires cooperatives to pay above-market retail rates for excess electricity from small private solar systems. This policy results in increased energy costs for cooperatives, causing a cost shift that disproportionately affects member-owners who do not want or cannot afford solar panels. Legislation to update this policy gained momentum but was not included in the final budget package. However, our coalition expanded as policymakers recognized the inequity of the current law, and we will continue to address this issue in the coming year.

MREA also led efforts to lift Minnesota's moratorium on new nuclear energy. MREA helped establish the Minnesota Nuclear Energy Alliance a coalition of nearly 40 stakeholders representing utilities, labor, business, agriculture, and the environment — to advocate for access to next-generation nuclear power. These technologies offer safe, carbon-free, continuous power that could help meet Minnesota's carbon-free electricity goals. While the moratorium remains, support is increasing across the state. We hope the coalition will soon end Minnesota's nuclear moratorium and allow Minnesotans to have this important conversation.

Achievements from the 2025 Session Tax Fairness for Co-ops: After extensive negotiations, a significant win was achieved with the passage of MREA's property tax clarification bill in the final tax bill. This reform corrects how electric cooperative infrastructure is taxed and will save Minnesota's co-ops, and their member-owners, millions of dollars in the future. The bill received bipartisan support and was prioritized by legislative leaders in both chambers. This outcome protects our ability to invest in rural infrastructure without unfair tax burdens.


No New Mandates: Multiple proposals that would have imposed costly regulations on cooperatives were successfully opposed. Thanks to advocacy from coop member-owners and leadership in both parties, flexibility for local, member-governed utilities was preserved.

Data Centers: Lawmakers debated the impact of large data centers' growth on the power grid. A bipartisan agreement was reached, including new energy efficiency requirements, fees supporting conservation programs, and tax incentives tied to clean energy usage. Thanks to MREA's efforts, a detrimental provision targeting data center-related growth which would have disproportionately impacted rural cooperatives like ours, was successfully blocked.

MREA and Kandiyohi Power Cooperative remain steadfast in our commitment to advocating for smart and equitable legislation that protects the interests of our rural cooperative member-owners. These collective efforts ensure that our communities receive reliable, affordable, and equitable energy policies. However, the strength of our advocacy also relies on the voices of our member-owners. We encourage everyone to engage actively by reaching out to their legislators and expressing their support for sensible energy reforms. With continued collaboration and grassroots engagement, we will carry these priorities forward-honoring the past, navigating the present, and powering Minnesota's future.
